FUND RAISING ACTIVITIES

Please note the brief article on Page 1 concerning the wine tasting events that have produced extra income for the Society. The Dairy Queen in Newark, sponsored a Fort Delaware Society day on June 17, during which a percentage of their gross sales went to the Society. Board members Edie Mahoney, David Price and Jayne McCormick worked together with Laura Lee (State Park Staff) and Kim Johnson (Parks office in Dover) to write a grant to the Delaware Community Fund to support a program to underwrite the cost for school children to visit the Fort, who could not otherwise afford the per person fee. The program also includes an educational segment to increase the value of their visit.

OUTREACH EFFORTS CONTINUE

Our outreach program is an important part of our mission to promote Fort Delaware as well as the Society. Through this activity, many new people are contacted and made aware of the Fort's role in history and the research resources the Society offers. Director Dan Cashin presented a series of seminars for the third time at an all-day encampment at Manor College near Jenkintown, PA. He and Director Hugh Simmons staffed an information table, distributing Society handouts at a two-day annual Civil War event at Neshaminy Park in PA. Dan dressed as a rebel POW when he spoke at Marshallton Park. Jayne McCormick, David Price, Sally Kuntz and Rich Hoffman staffed an information table at Newark (DE) Night on June 6th. For the third consecutive year, the Society was represented at Newark Community Day, an allday event on the campus of the U of D on September 19th. Well over one hundred organizations set up booths, and over 1000 local citizens attended this popular event. Thanks to generosity of Jayne the McCormick, the Society was protected from the sun by a large tent-type shelter. Jayne, Hugh Simmons, David Price and Sally Kuntz spent the day greeting visitors. Edie Mahoney and Bill Robelen participated in a ceremony at Mt. Salem Methodist Church in Rockford Park on May 30th honoring Admiral Samuel Du-Pont and other Civil War dead from Delaware.
