60th ANNUAL LUNCHEON

The Fort Delaware Society held its 60th Anniversary at the Annual Luncheon on March 7, 2010 at the Christiana Hilton. Originally scheduled for February 7, the event had to be postponed due to a major snow storm that dumped 25 inches of the white stuff on northern Delaware the day before. In his opening remarks, President Bill Robelen made it clear that his promise made when he was first elected President in 1984 that it would not snow the day of the meeting was still valid, despite the fact that most roads were impassable and parking lots had not been cleared. The featured Guest Speaker was David Rickman, Publications/ Exhibits Coordinator for the Division of Parks & Recreation. David is a talented artist in his own right and presented an excellent Power Point assisted talk about Max Neugas, a Confederate POW who was imprisoned at Fort Delaware after the Battle of Gettysburg in 1863. While there, he made a number of beautiful and detailed sketches of the Fort and of his fellow prisoners. The Boston Atheneum has one original in its collection, the Delaware Historical Society has one, and the Fort Delaware Society is proud to have six originals. They are included in our Catalog of Historical Photographs.

Chairman Craven praised Don for his contribution in establishing solid business practices and accounting procedures. Kay Keenan, a Director for the past 19 years, graciously agreed to assume the Treasurer's duties. In the short time she has been in office she has demonstrated her eagerness to be involved in every aspect of the position. The task of managing an organization like the Society becomes more complicated each year, and the Board deserves your support for all their efforts throughout the year.

LIBRARY DATA BASE COMPLETED

The W. Emerson Wilson Memorial Library has been an invaluable asset to the Society as well as to the many researchers and authors who have used this resource for many years. It has continued to grow through the generosity of members and others who have contributed to it, bringing the total to over 1800 volumes. The old card system has served us well, but the computer age makes things more efficient, plus it offers more information and related benefits. Using a data base system designed by Director Hugh Simmons, Office Manager Martha Bennett, V.P. Edie Mahoney and Director McCormick Jayne have worked diligently to examine each and every book and entered the pertinent information into our computer. The process began late last fall and is now complete. What remains now is to compile a CD with the data and distribute it free of charge to all libraries and Civil War related organizations in Delaware and surrounding communities. In time it will also be posted on our Web site so that interested persons may be informed of this valuable research resource. We are indebted to Hugh, Martha, Edie and Jayne for all their efforts to bring this project to completion.

VICTORIAN KIDSFEST

The Second Annual Victorian KidsFest will be held at the Fort on Sunday, June 13 from noon to 4 PM. The Park has purchased a 20' x 60' tent that will be used to conduct all activities outside the Fort, keeping everything in one dedicated location. Notices will be distributed to school children in the three local districts in May. The exhibition 19th century baseball game with players in period-correct uniforms will be repeated. Children again will be invited to "enlist" in the Army and to participate in a variety of crafts, including making cloth dolls, pine cone bird feeders, clothes pin soldiers and pinwheels. Everyone will be able to examine a fascinating collection of artifacts from the Civil War era, and we plan to have special live music throughout the day.

Many more exciting activities, games and prizes are being planned to round out the day, but parents, grandparents, aunts and uncles need to mark their calendars now for Sunday, June 13, 2010 and round up all the kids they can to be a part of this very special day at the Fort.
